Previous Four Years in Review

2018-19

 The last pre-pandemic year for testing and accountability results

2019-20

- Schools went remote in March
- No state tests administered in spring, and no testing and accountability results (except graduation rate)

2020-21

- Schools started remote; ES and MS rotations in Oct/Nov
- Everyone back to remote in January
- In-person for K-3 (all) and 4-12 (rotations) in mid-Feb
- Moved to all in-person In mid-March
- State tests administered, but only for students who were in-person
 - About half of students were in Virtual Academy
 - Others who did not want to participate
 - New Reading EOG tests with new standards

2021-22

- Schools operate in-person but with pandemic-driven impacts
 - Masking, sanitizing, distancing, etc.
 - Staffing difficulties due to quarantines, lack of subs, etc.




2021-22 Accountability Designations

- School Performance Grades State system that classifies schools with a grade of A through F, which is based on:
 - The percentage of students who score proficient on certain state tests (80%)
 - The amount of academic growth students make on those tests that year (20%)
- <u>Low Performing Schools</u> Schools with an overall School Performance Grade of D or F and either "Met" or "Did Not Meet" growth
- Neither of these designations were applied to any NC schools in 2019-20 or 2020-21 due to the pandemic
- Compared to 2018-19, in 2021-22 both WCPSS and NC saw increases in:
 - Schools receiving School Performance Grades of D or F
 - Schools designated as Low Performing




WCPSS School Performance Grade Summary







NC and WCPSS Both Saw a Decline in School Performance Grades in 2022






NC and WCPSS Both Have More Low Performing Schools Than Pre-Pandemic








WCPSS Overall Proficiency Over Four Very Different Years






WCPSS Students Outperformed North Carolina in EOG Proficiency in 2021-22

Subgroup Proficiency Gaps Fairly Stable Between 2018-19 and 2021-22




EVAAS Value-Added Growth Model

- Measures the academic progress a group of students has made in a grade/subject/course compared to other students in the state with similar achievement histories.
- Has nothing to do with proficiency
- Schools and subgroups achieve one of three designations:
 - Exceeded Growth
 - Met Growth
 - Did Not Meet Growth



80% of WCPSS Schools Exceeded or Met Growth For the First Time Since 2013-14



Percent of School Subgroups at Each Growth Level






Context for Graduation Rate


- The graduation rate metric tracks the number of students who graduated **four (or five) years** after entering high school. For the 2022 cohort, that was the **2018-19 school year**.
- Many of these students may still graduate, but it may take more than four years to make it to the finish line as non-promotion rates increased in 2020-21.
- The pandemic years also posed challenges to high school staff in maintaining contact and connections with students, which we know is paramount in assisting them to graduation.

Four and Five Year Graduation Rates






Black, Hispanic, and English Learners Have Experienced a Larger Decrease in Four Year Graduation Rate Over the Last Few Years






School Graduation Rate Summary






Non-Promotion Rates Up Significantly in 2020-21






Percentage of Juniors Meeting All ACT College Ready Benchmarks

Advanced Placement (AP) Test Participation Continues to Climb






NC and WCPSS Saw a Decline in % of Exams with Scores of 3+ in 2021

Conclusions

- 2021-22 results should be considered a new baseline as we continue to move forward through/out of the pandemic
- However, the impact of pandemic-related disruptions will likely continue to ripple through these indicators in future years, both in WCPSS and across the state
 - Impact of retention rates on graduation rates
 - Impact of pandemic on post-secondary enrollments
 - Grade 3 Reading proficiency did not rebound in 2021-22
