Good friend, I am building this bridge for him."



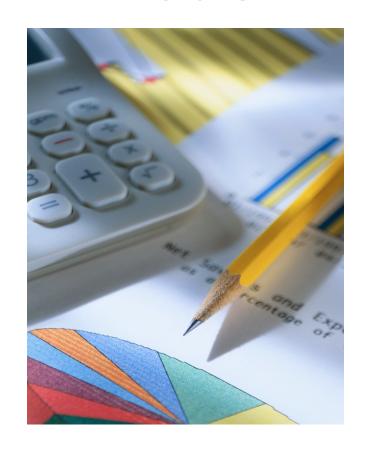
Strategic Problem

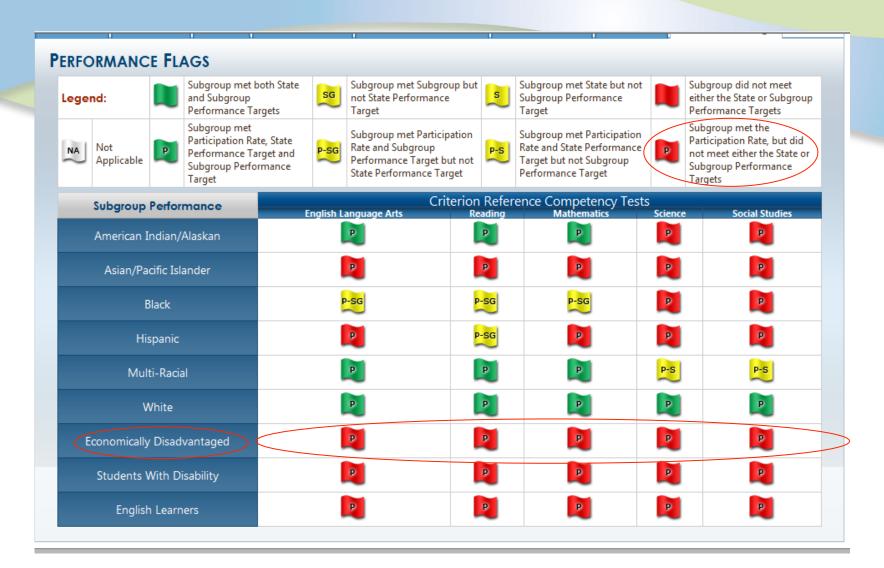

The Bridge Initiative Strategy

Highly integrated, cross-functional strategy designed to bridge the cultural, socio-economic and historical divides that undermine student performance and achievement by:

- Developing a holistic understanding of the root causes of underperformance by students;
- Analyzing student and school achievement and career readiness data to determine best practices and inform resource allocation;
- Realigning the existing federal funding allocated through Title I,
 Title II, Race-to-the-Top and School Improvement Grant; and
- Evaluating Pre-K 12 curriculum, program offerings and curriculum alignment with common core college and career readiness standards.

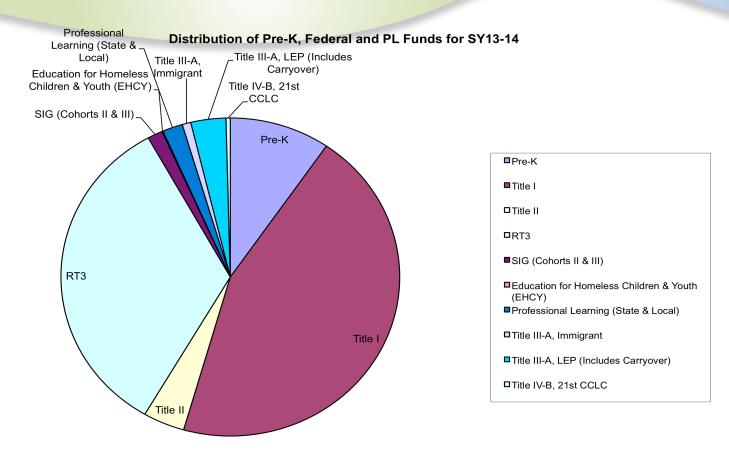
